

SENATOR GOLL: Yes, I support the amendment?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm not going to have, after I sit down this time, anything else to say on this bill while it's before the Legislature, but I'm sure that nobody could be distressed if I would talk about it to others after the Legislature passes it. I have to ask one more question of Senator Goll. Then if Senator Morehead doesn't mind answering it, then she can tell me and I'll ask her too. Senator Goll, if I have questions about this bill, would you rather I raised them on the floor of the Legislature or go ahead and let this troubled piece of legislation go on its way?

SENATOR GOLL: Senator Chambers, I really...makes no difference to me whatsoever. If you want to raise those questions here or out in the corridor or in your office or mine, outside, inside, up or down, it makes no difference.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you're definitely satisfied with the bill as it stands with this amendment?

SENATOR GOLL: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Senator Morehead, Senator Goll was very combative in his answer. Would you rather I raised the questions here or someplace else or it doesn't make any difference either?

SENATOR MOREHEAD: It only makes a difference from the standpoint that I think we've subjected the members of this Legislature to great hours of debate and finite analysis of this legislation and to take up more of their time on the legislative arena I think is, at this point, in the legislative session nonproductive.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you're satisfied?

SENATOR MOREHEAD: Yes, I am satisfied and I would be happy to discuss it with you any time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I won't be angry with you...

SENATOR MOREHEAD: No, I understand.
