bit disappointing sitting here and not being able to do anything about the problems facing agriculture and at least not talking about them. This is a particular resolution, I think, that makes a statement, a statement that we are concerned about the way in which our products are exported to foreign nations and I think that is a fair statement to make and I think one that we should consider. This resolution certainly is not going to probably change anything with the Cargo Preference Act, but I think it does lend a voice to our congressional and our senatorial delegations that we need this particular act to be examined again and possibly changed and hopefully eliminated, but if it is not, at least we have made a statement one way. Now I can appreciate what Senator Chizek said to me privately, what Senator Vickers has pointed out to us and Senator DeCamp and I think that their thoughts are worthwhile as well, but representing agriculture has not been a very easy task this year and I think that this would be one statement we could make that would be, I think, a positive statement on behalf of our agricultural industries. So with that, Mr. President, I'd ask the body to adopt LR 264.

PRESIDENT: The motion is to adopt the resolution, 264. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. The motion is on the adoption of the resolution just discussed, LR 264. Please record your vote. Have you all voted? We're voting on resolution 264. Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of LR 264.
