SENATOR NELSON: ...probably \$109,679 original block grant carryover from July 1st of 1984 and for alcohol and drugs \$726,620 which is heavier on the alcohol and drugs that they did not get in mental health but my questions, I guess maybe I need to turn my light on to answer questions or to ask questions.

SENATOR SMITH: If you have questions, Arlene, will you please turn your light on because I wanted to have Senator Lynch finish his then. So you think that there is approximately a million dollars there but it is not necessarily only in mental health, it seems to be more alcohol funds.

SENATOR NELSON: Yes, that is correct. However, when the Governor vetoed my bill, and as I said I am sure on the floor the other day, I have been assured and that will be from this money right here, we are to receive \$500,000 for this year, \$500,000 for next year which are the two years that were in my A bill. Of this, 300,000 is to go to alcohol and drugs, 200,000 to mental health.

SENATOR SMITH: All right, just a minute then. Yes, Senator Lynch, Senator Lynch...
