SENATOR GOODRICH: You have no assurances of that.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Right.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Thank you.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Carsten.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I rise to oppose the motion to suspend the rules to put into a bill that has no relationship to the motion that is presented to us. He is... Senator Johnson is trying to bring back a piece of legislation that was passed, not with my vote, but was passed by this body. It was two subject matters in one bill, and as I said on General File, one was trying to camouflage the other and it did. The body bought the package. They sent it to the Governor. The Governor bought it and signed it and it became law. Now, all of a sudden, for some reason or other which is sure funny to me, the whole ball of wax that wanted the law so badly now wants to repeal part of it. When the opportunity was there why wasn't it done then? To come in at this late time when we are trying to get the absolute necessity passed through this body, and important legislation, to come in and piddle around with something we have already done, was approved, signed and sealed seems to be clear out of order. I certainly hope that this body has got enough good, common sense to realize that and vote accordingly and not approve this motion to suspend the rules. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Remmers, Senator DeCamp, Senator Beutler, then Senator Hefner. Senator Remmers.

SENATOR REMMERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, 662 passed as a package. If it had not been a package 662 would not have passed. It was signed as a package. I do not think it is proper for us to strip a part of a bill that passed only because there were two parts in it and then leave the one part in there. I'm sure that our constituents must wonder what we are doing up here. Furthermore, I opposed 126, the weatherization bill, very vigorously for five years, or this is the fifth year. We finally worked out what I think is a pretty good bill. I'd hate to have to

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
