

vehicles division. I, personally, don't feel that this is asking too much to help recover some of that deficit within that division.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Hoagland, the last speaker, the last light I have on. Oh, Senator DeCamp came on again.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I also rise in support of Senator Warner's motion to raise this bill from committee for two reasons. Number one, this is a service that we actually use in our law practice. We request at least 100 of these a year and probably substantially more. Let me tell you it is a tremendous bargain for the kind of information that you get. I would have no difficulty paying \$2.00, \$3.00 or more to get the kind of information that we can get through this system, through this process. It is very useful information to the user. As a user, as a repeated user of this information I certainly have no difficulty raising the fee from \$1.00 to \$2.00, to \$4.00 I think would also be appropriate and you could argue for. Now, point number two, I have here a list, and I know many of you have seen it, as to what other states charge for roughly the same service. There is only one other state on this list, the State of Wyoming, that charges \$1.00. Louisiana charges \$10.00. There are several states that charge \$5.00, Arkansas, Idaho, New Hampshire, New Jersey. North Carolina charges \$7.00. A number of states charge \$3.00. Some charge \$2.00. Raising the fee to \$2.00 would put us in the bottom percentile of the states that are listed, and once again it is a tremendous bargain for the information you get. I would have no hesitancy whatsoever to raise it to this amount, particularly where it raises a half a million dollars and can save a cut in some other valuable program here in state government. So I would encourage the body to raise this from committee and act on the bill this year. Thank you.
