SENATOR HOAGLAND: Same with committee amendment number six, colleagues. We would urge you to reject that.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Any further discussion on that? You've heard the explanation on amendment six. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 0 ayes, 20 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of committee amendment number six.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right, that fails. Are there any other amendments on the bill?

CLERK: Mr. President, yes.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Pirsch, did you wish to present another amendment? All right.

This is the legislation that is required from the constitutional amendment that the voters passed last November. We are following through this legislation. We have now established that it is the local law enforcement who will be able to seize money now, as well as the conveyances and the drugs that they have always been able to seize. There is actually nothing much new in this bill, except we are adding the ability to seize money. We have made certain allowances for the conveyances.
