

Haberman amendment.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Pat is going to read the amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Pardon me?

SENATOR HABERMAN: I would like to ask the Clerk to read the amendment so everybody knows what we are talking about.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right. Mr. Clerk, would you read the amendment, please.

CLERK: (Read Haberman amendment found on page 2398 of the Legislative Journal. Roll call vote taken. See pages 2398-99 of the Legislative Journal.) 10 ayes, 34 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The motion fails.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Schmit would move to amend the bill. (See Schmit amendment found on page 2399 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: The call is raised. Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, very briefly, my amendment limits the provisions of the bill to the corn and wheat check-off boards. If you support the bill in its present form then I hope you would support it in this form. We are very short on time. I would move the adoption of the amendment and I'll answer any questions you might have. It limits the bill to wheat and corn. Wheat is very unique. We've had this provisions for many years. It has the responsibility of trying to find a market for more than half of our production. It is very important that we have this for wheat particularly. I move the adoption.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Vickers is next. I've been asked to announce that the Constitutional Revision and Recreation Committee is now having a meeting under the north balcony. Senator Vickers, please.

SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President and members, as I indicated earlier, this amendment, I think, is a bad idea. I think it is a bad idea to say that we are going to allow corn and wheat producers, through their check-off funds, to be able
