

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, we got two, oh, okay, whichever. Say it again.

SENATOR WARNER: Just on that program alone was \$1.3 million in the appropriation. That reduced it by \$600,000 so it is significant.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. We took a program and cut it 50 percent without anybody feeling any agony other than a few of us. Now Senator DeCamp comes saying cut 1 percent and listen to them squeal. It's arbitrary. It's unfair. They can't stand it. They can't bear it, but these are grown people and they can't bear a 1 percent cut? How quickly the worm has turned because now somebody else's ox is being gored. Somebody else is being dealt with who has lobby strength, who might be able to buy liquor for the senators or give them food or take them to the Nebraska Club or out to Capital Beach or wherever they take them, load them up on cattle trucks out here at whatever entrance it is by Abraham Lincoln and cart them off to feed their worthless hides, whatever they feed them when they go to these things. What Senator DeCamp is offering doesn't sound too bad for me and Senator Goodrich talks about the University. I've got an amendment that is going to deal with trying to bring some equity to the players over there who bring a lot of money to the University and I'm going to discuss some points in greater detail at that point, but he said something about matching funds. Do you know what that University does over there? A player on scholarship, if because of need, can qualify for \$1,800 under the Pell grant, the NCAA rules allow them to get only half of it. So what do you think becomes of the other \$900? Who do you think gets the other \$900? You check it out. This same University that says they shouldn't get a nickel. And do you want me to tell you something else they do that fattens their budget? And you all on the Budget Committee ought to know this and all you others who say the players should not get a nickel just like you're against the babies here. They will get a guy from out of state and his scholarship is based on what the out of state cost per credit hour is. So in the summertime they take out an apartment in his name and he doesn't even have to stay there and the next time around he is an instate student and there is a difference of 60 some odd dollars per credit hour and that money goes back into the Athletic Department budget.
