

SENATOR BARRETT: The motion to reconsider passes.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Warner and Wesely would move to return the bill.

SENATOR BARRETT: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Well, Mr. President, I move the amendment be adopted, but I have got...I have to tell the body that the fiscal office just brought me a revised calculation which would indicate, if their figures are correct, that at 4 percent and \$7 million exemption the Fair would pay about \$47,000 less than last year. My presumption was that if they lost \$180,000 at 5 percent, and you went the 4, the difference was half and that was \$90,000 which seemed the very logical thing to do. But I am not about to suggest the adoption of an amendment that has a different impact than what I honestly thought it had. So if the amendment is adopted, the receipts instead of the Lincoln track paying \$84,000 more it would pay \$47,000 less and that makes a swing of \$130,000. So you should know that. Now in comparison Atokad still would be paying \$41,000 less, Columbus \$100,000, Fonner and Ak-Sar-Ben \$300,000, assuming the same handle. But Lincoln would also be paying now to break even, which is what I thought. Now that doesn't bother me because again whatever receipt profits Lincoln has why it goes to the operation of the Fair. So, you know, that benefits a whole lot of programs. But I don't want to suggest the adoption of an amendment when I know just now that the figure was different than I thought. But I still would move its adoption. But you should know that the loss of revenue instead of nearly \$600,000 it would be a little over \$700,00, unless Sunday track racing at Ak-Sar-Ben generates a whole pot full more money. So you know the impact, and I don't have time to make an adjustment. The motion is to reconsider. I will move its adoption, but it is not a draw even amendment and I thought it was.

SENATOR BARRETT: Thank you, Senator Warner. Senator Sieck is up with Senator Higgins on deck.

SENATOR SIECK: Mr. President and members of the body, I did support this amendment or this reconsidering. I didn't do it because of Lincoln. I did it because I have got a lot of horsemen out there in my area that will suffer tremendously if we do not help them. And I know that the horsemen are
