

SENATOR HABERMAN: Yes.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right, we are voting on the adoption of the Haberman amendment. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Read the roll call vote as found on pages 2449-50 of the Legislative Journal.) 19 ayes, 26 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The motion fails. Next.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Haberman would move to amend.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Is this the one on the ballet hall?

CLERK: Historical Society.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Pardon?

CLERK: Historical Society.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Oh, the Historical Society, okay. In the proposal, I believe the Governor suggested this, I want to take \$75,000 out and charge admission for the Historical Society. My idea on this is, let's charge admissions but with legislative intent which will be on the floor debate if they have groups of school children as a class taking a tour, there is no charge. But there is really no free rides and why we should give up \$75,000 to have free admittance, it is really kind of hard for me to understand. Therefore, I would like to ask that you support this amendment to take the \$75,000 out of the budget. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Warner, please.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, Senator Haberman pointed out the list in suggested admissions. Actually, during the appropriation process we gave serious thought to substantial shift to fees for a variety of places with things included to be the State Museum, the Kennard and Ferguson Home here, Neligh Mills, the Neihardt Center, the Museum of the Missouri River, the George Norris Home at McCook, Fort Robinson, the Cather Home at Red Cloud.
