

SENATOR HABERMAN: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you in favor of museum employees being paid?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Absolutely.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you in favor of those who put on something that you are willing to spend \$15.00 to see being paid?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

SENATOR HABERMAN: I might as well close, Mr. President, I don't...

SPEAKER NICHOL: No, Senator Marsh has her light on.

SENATOR MARSH: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, tourism is an important item in our state. If some of the tourists decided not to expend the money to stop over because the museum was no longer free as they look in their guide book, we lose more than the few dollars that Senator Haberman is offering us as a "savings". It may be a very costly procedure. It is an item that was seriously considered several years ago by the Appropriations Committee, and when we discovered that it would work detrimentally for our state even with allowing school children in free, we felt that it was not a wise decision for the cost of having to hire extra people to take tickets to be on hand to receive the "dollars or fifty cents", would be added employees who must always be available at a door when someone would come in. I will be voting against the amendment. Thank you very much.
