vote against it. But for the rest of you that are trying to find the best course of action, what's the fairest way to deal with this issue, I ask you to please consider this motion to put back in some of those exclusions that I don't think are justified.

PRESIDENT: The motion is the adoption of the Wesely amendment to the Beutler amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Please record your vote on the Wesely amendment to the Beutler amendment. Have you all voted? The motion is the Wesely amendment to the Beutler amendment of LB 722. Please record your vote. Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 17 ayes, 21 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Wesely's amendment to the Beutler amendment.

PRESIDENT: The amendment fails. Now, Mr. Clerk, do you have another amendment?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Wesely would move to amend the Beutler amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Wesely, you have another amendment up here.

SENATOR WESELY: No, that's not applicable. I'll withdraw it.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is withdrawn. We're back to the Beutler amendment I assume. Now then we'll move to the other speaking list which was started on the main motion which...Senator Morehead, you are first in the speaking order on the Beutler amendment itself.

SENATOR MOREHEAD: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body, if any member of our constituency or any member of the press or any member of the lobby or our families or our friends think that this process is fun, they probably better stop again because we find ourselves pitted against very good friends in this particular legislative body, friends that we've worked with on the Appropriations Committee with, friends that we have oftentimes agreed with philosophically and now we find ourselves at odds. But I think the first year that I came down here I was one of those votes that cast a "yes" saying that we as a legislative body should in

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
