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blame if the lobbyists are successful, Senator Beutler, I'll take the blame because this is not a political thing in any way, that if they have a chance to mount support and head off some things. I can tell you, and I feel very strongly, that the committee members, the nine members in there that put their hands up, though nothing other than we have two options, talk against the two percent across the board, hope it doesn't pass, or let it pass. That is the one option. The other option is you have told us there are a lot of you out here that want us, because we have access to the information, we've been studying it for so long, to make more logical cuts. Obviously, we couldn't do that in an hour and a half. It occurred to me that we need some time. That is why the motion came up, and that is why it wasn't better thought out as far as a number or anything like that. But that is where we are right now. We thought it must be presented to you to see if you approve it. To the philosophy of it, personally, there isn't anybody in this room that needs to get back home to their business more than I. There are some that need to get there as much as I, but nobody more than I. There isn't anybody in this room that wouldn't rather be spending the next three days doing something I would like to do, such as being out on the golf course or something that is fun. But your committee has made a commitment to you, that if you accept this motion, that they are going to work their rear ends off for another three hard days. If you do accept this motion I'm going to tell you personally that I'm going to be expecting the rest of you to be working your rear ends off right along side of us. That is why Senator Lundy mentioned to you that we would like participation.

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: We would like to have you, personally I would like to, I'm going to suggest to Chairman Warner if we can get commitments from you, and I would hope we get personal commitments to him this afternoon, that we'll move out of that appropriations room and we'll some place where there is more comfortable seating and more room for more senators to be there and sit there with us for eight hours and nine hours, and listen to what we listen to, hear what we hear, understand the implications of what is involved for cutting this thing, understanding the political reality of the constituencies involved, and then say, yes, that is a good idea, let's try it, it's not going to be easy, we are
