So, Mr. President, I would just suggest that we go ahead and take the vote as to those who wish to go along with Senator Warner's proposal, and those who don't we'll go from there.

PRESIDENT: At the request of the Speaker then I think we will have the Chair read the motion and we'll take a vote on it. Not the Chair but the funny fella down there at the secretary's desk.
