CLERK: Senator Schmit. Okay. I have nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The Schmit amendment has been withdrawn. Very well, and now we're back to the bill. Is there further discussion on the bill now? Anyone other than Senator DeCamp who will close? Anyone else to wish to speak on the bill? Senator DeCamp, you may close.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, I should be nice and apologetic and kind of mealy-mouthed on this issue because obviously I want the bill to advance and I do. But Senator Rupp raised some questions. I think some of them have to be dealt with. Senator Rupp said he was going to put a kill motion on. I invite him to. I beg him to. I would point out most of the groups that led the opposition and I just got a note from one of them now, Farmers Union for example, leading the battle for the bottle bill and against the litter bill. Just got a note from them where they explained that they're one of the acting participants and they now support this program and so on and so forth. Senator Wesely just came up to me.
