

SENATOR HOAGLAND: It's...it's...here we go.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Spousal support is defined as a support that goes into a family a portion of which is child support.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what is the rest of it?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Yes, here it is. It is on page 6 to 7 of the bill. It is a definition of spousal support. It shall mean support for a spouse or former spouse when ordered as part of an order providing for child support, provided the child and the former spouse are living in the same household.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So it is alimony also.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Yes, spousal support is child support and alimony in the case where the child is living with the spouse.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But the spousal...to make it clear that we are dealing with two items here, there is the support for the child living in the house plus alimony for the parent who is living in the house with the child.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: That's right, but the federal regulations require that alimony be included only in the kind of situation that is included here and that is where there is also a child for whom child support has been ordered living in the same household.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But there is no...these two are linked together in the situation that you are mentioning where the parent...

SENATOR HOAGLAND: That's right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...is in the house with the child. So we are talking about in addition to using these procedures of collection for child support, use them for alimony too, collecting alimony also.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Where a child lives in the same
