PRESIDENT: Senator Johnson, did you wish to...

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Yes, Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I am in total sympathy with Senator DeCamp's dilemma. He has an amendment which is designed to impose the "DeCampian" point of view on banks, but that point of view is not imposable until ten o'clock this morning. And I have no objection to having this bill passed over, until ten o'clock this morning, with our then moving on to the next tax bill which is the parimutuel tax. As soon as we complete that, if we could come back to 717, the DeCamp amendment should be ready, that would be fine by me. Would that be okay by you, Mr. Speaker? It has just arrived though, apparently. Of course it's not been printed and circulated, but I can't complain too badly about that because the one we just adopted was neither printed nor circulated. So...

PRESIDENT: Do you have anything further on the bill on the desk? If this matter is not ready to be discussed at the present time, we can pass over. The Clerk has another matter on the bill.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator DeCamp would move to amend the bill. (See DeCamp amendment found on pages 2489-92 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, this is the amendment that is being passed out now, I trust. I've got a cover sheet that explains just simply what the amendment is.
