

that end." That is what Senator Hannibal gets up and agrees to, that is what Warner agreed to. That is if you read the whole debate from that day, Senator Harris demanded, Senator Landis demanded, Senator...one after another demanded that they present a \$15 million package. They specifically said that they were yielding their position so that could be voted on. All I am saying is now if we don't take up that package, as was promised on this floor, and 42 strong, you voted for it, then you have reneged, you have repudiated what you agreed on one week ago. You have repudiated because you are wanting now to go with 2 percent and a completely hokey scheme in between. The idea was the committee would get together and bring us selected cuts. If anyone wants the debate of that entire session, or that hour or whatever it was during which we had that, I wish you would get a copy. I have a copy here and I would make it for anybody that wants it. Once you read it you will have no doubt what we agreed upon. We agreed we would sit here, let them work for one week, we would come back, they would offer a package and we would vote on that package. The whole purpose was because if you start delineating and separating one thing after another, as we are doing now, it is going to fall apart. It was specifically understood that that would be offered before the 2 percent...

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR DECAMP: ...even though a tactical advantage existed. Yes, if you had voted on the 2 percent last week it would have passed. But I can't, I can't in good conscience vote for 2 percent until you live up to the original agreement to vote on the Appropriations Committee package. That is what was agreed to. If that fails, then we take up to the 2 percent. That is what was understood. You know it, I know it, as I say I have handed out two pages here. I think you should get all of the debate. I urge us to take up the package of the Appropriations Committee under whatever format we have to do it. As I say, I think the ones that agreed to it should live up to that agreement now. I didn't go to Yale, but I think it is intellectually dishonest not to take it up.
