day after tomorrow, which is the third last day, the 88th day, will be the last day for Select File bills and motions to return. This is the most important reminder. Remember, Monday is the last day for Select and motions to return. Tuesday and Wednesday will be the Final Reading days. Any veto override attempts will be done on Wednesday. Some of the bills you have listed to deal with are 460, which I mentioned before, and should be done according to the Appropriations Chairman and Vice-chairman and members of the Appropriations Committee. LB 31 also, which has to do with fees, should be handled this session. 600, I understand there is a little bit of controversy about it but maybe 4.5 billion are riding on it. And may I say to those of you who are interested in LB 600 which is a Judiciary bill, the gentleman from Kansas City having to do with this type of a situation which is a collection of ADC monies will be here Friday, that is tomorrow, and I think he will be here in the forenoon, but at such time as he is here, we will have an announcement that any of you having problems with LB 600 can visit with him so that you will know whether it is or isn't necessary for us to pass the bill this year. LB 539 changes provisions for state sales and income tax rates and, of course, that should be done on the next last day or possibly the last day. Actually this morning we are starting with LB 501 which Senator Warner and the committee and Senator Beutler have all advised me this is necessary or should be done ahead of LB 722 so we will go with 501 the first thing this morning. With that, Mr. President, I would suggest that we work diligently today and plan to stay late tonight. I don't know whether Senator Beyer brought some of his pig meat for us to eat at suppertime or not, but if not, we will make some kind of arrangement. But we will plan to break at lunch time, of course, but not break at the evening eating time. So we will continue on as long as necessary this evening without a break for dinner. Thank you, Mr. President.
