SENATOR LAMB: Time has expired. The motion is the adoption of the Chambers amendment. Those in support vote yes, those opposed vote no.

CLERK: Senator Lamb voting no.

SENATOR LAMB: Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 3 ayes, 27 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

SENATOR LAMB: The amendment failed.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Labeledz would move to amend the Beutler-Vickers amendment. (See page 2536 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR LAMB: Senator Labeledz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Thank you, Mr. President. This is an amendment that I have been waiting for all day. I voted for most of the cuts to be put back in this morning because I feel very strongly about eliminating an entire program, and as Senator Marsh said a couple of times on the floor, we are eliminating programs that we have had for years without a public hearing, without having the people involved, and with this amendment many of you know that I am trying to put the ADC coverage for the unborn...for the pregnant woman and her unborn child. I feel very strongly about it. The ADC unborn program now that we have acknowledges in law the humanity of the unborn child and this is very important, because if we strike this program, we are striking the only part of the statutes that refers to the unborn child. We will have nothing in the statutes that will say that the unborn child, or as many of you call it, the fetus, is an unborn child, if the program is eliminated, this acknowledgement will be lost in our statutes.
