

SENATOR LABEDZ: They go together.

SENATOR LAMB: Thank you. The motion...

SENATOR LABEDZ: For nine months they go together.

SENATOR LAMB: The motion is the adoption of the Labedz amendment. Those in support vote yes. Those opposed vote no. Have you all voted? One person excused.

SENATOR LABEDZ: I think I will have to have a call of the house and a roll call vote because I know there is one senator that wants to be up here. And I will take call ins.

SENATOR LAMB: The motion is a call of the house. Those in support vote yes, those opposed no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 12 ayes, 0 nays to go under call.

SENATOR LAMB: The house is under call. All unauthorized personnel please leave the floor. All senators check in. Senator Sieck. We are looking for Senator Landis. Senator Sieck. Could the Sergeant-at-Arms find Senator Sieck, please. Senator Abboud is also missing. All members are present. Please call the roll, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See pages 2536-37 of the Legislative Journal.) 25 ayes, 19 nays, Mr. President.

SENATOR LAMB: The motion is adopted. Do you have anything else, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion I have is by Senator Wesely. (Wesely amendment appears on page 2537 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR LAMB: The Chair recognizes Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Mr. President and members, this amendment would place back into the budget the money taken out for the state employee staffing of the Legislature. We would cut back from 2 to 1 1/2 employees per member of the Legislature. I put this up recognizing that a cut in staffing is something that ought to be debated and discussed and decided, not part of a package and anonymous among a number of other cuts.
