

PRESIDENT: Senator Marsh has closed and the question now is the amendment, the motion to reconsider the homemakers provision. Senator Nichol. The board needs to be cleared I guess. All right, vote aye or nay on this. The motion is to reconsider the homemakers provision in the appropriations bill, displaced homemaker. The motion to reconsider will require 25 votes for approval. Have you all voted? Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Mr. President, could I have a roll call vote since we're under call?

PRESIDENT: A roll call vote has been requested. Call the roll, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Roll call vote read as found on page 2544 of the Legislative Journal.) 22 ayes, 22 nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion fails.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion I have to the bill is also a priority motion. It is offered by Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT: The call of the house is raised.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to bracket LB 722 until June 10, 1985.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, we need to talk turkey. Senator Nichol, without saying it has indicated we are turkeys and have been turkeys, but that's all right. Maybe he is correct. But nevertheless, I told you several days ago that I have a job to do as a member of this Legislature and I'm going to do it. You have seen that other people have gotten very angry at the way that the procedures were being utilized and those people who got angry over procedural points probably couldn't understand why I was very exercised to use a word which is a favorite of Senator Vard Johnson when you cut programs that I thought should not have been cut. So why should it make me any difference if we stay here a while and give some debate to these other aspects that I think ought to be debated? No consideration was given to very serious issues by the majority of the body as I thought they should
