Sure, these agencies are on the edge of what many of us might call the scope of government, but I think it behooves us from time to time to be a little inclusive, to reach out a little further, to expand our concept of what our activity as a group, as a government is all about and to do these kinds of things. And at the very least, if you choose to chop them off, give them a hearing, give them a hearing. This is not giving them a hearing.

CLERK: 19 ayes, 0 nays to go under call.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries and the house is under call. Members, now please record your presence. Senator Schmit, please. Senator Scofield and Smith. Senator Landis. Senator Rod Johnson and Lynch and Tom Vickers. Senators Rod Johnson and Senator Lynch. Senator Dan Lynch. Senator Lynch and Rod Johnson, please return to the Legislative Chamber. The house is under call. Senators Lynch and Rod Johnson, please return to the Chamber. Here we are. All members are now present who are not excused. A roll call vote has been requested. May we have quiet in the Chamber, please. Call the roll, Mr. Clerk, aye and nay.
