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SENATOR HALL: How many clients in residential care in Region 4?

SENATOR CONWAY: I think if you turn to the additional units on there, I think you will see the numbers.

SENATOR HALL: How many is that?

SENATOR CONWAY: I'd have to look it up. We've been so involved in 722 that I haven't gotten back to this lately. But there are certainly more. That is one of the reasons you'd find cheaper administrative costs per person under economies of scale that would be associated with Region 6 in terms of the numbers. But I think that you will also find there is a fairly close balance for numbers of clients in each of the districts in terms of not being greatly disproportioned.

SENATOR HALL: Okay. What was the rationale then...I still don't...I'm not sure that Senator Goodrich...I at least understood the answer that Senator Goodrich got when he asked why Region 6 and why not say, for example, Region 1, or why not \$20,000 out of Region 1, 2, 3 maybe, or say \$10,000 out of 1, 2, 3, 5 and then \$50,000 out of Region 6? I mean how did we come up...how did you folks come up with the one hit out of Region 6?

SENATOR CONWAY: I think if you'll note on the bar graph, again those bars represent the breakdown of costs per client. Region 6 is spending \$26,000 per client. The other regions are spending \$13,000 and so forth. If you put the total budget together, I think you find that the various studies that have been done by outside expert consultants are saying and telling Region 6 that they are overfunded.

SENATOR HALL: What type of services are provided in Region 4?

SENATOR CONWAY: As you can see, social services administration, vocational, general services and residential.

SENATOR HALL: What type of residential?
