Have you all voted? Please record your vote on the motion to cease debate if you wish to vote. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 9 ayes, 17 nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion fails. The next one that wanted recognition was Senator Haberman. Do you wish to speak on this Hoagland motion to return?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President and members of the body, I won't take too much time. Senator Hoagland, may I ask you a question, please.

PRESIDENT: Senator Hoagland is available.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Hoagland, last night when you voted to advance the Beutler amendment, did you understand and know that we were talking about this package that we have all been working on that shows all the cuts?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Okay, thank you. On page 17 it shows the total reduction of \$15,991,528, you just made a remark that we cut the budget \$18 million. Could you please tell me where the other \$3 million came from?
