

CLERK: Senator, it has been reported to Final Reading. I just received it.

SENATOR DECAMP: So it is on Final, so bracketing until Tuesday would mean that we couldn't tamper with it until Tuesday and would settle the issue, so to speak. And so I would ask you to support it and I think we have been more than fair in terms of giving the votes on the major questions. I would ask you to support this.

PRESIDENT: Senator Richard Peterson, do you wish to speak on the motion to bracket? Senator Haberman, do you wish to speak on the motion to bracket until June 4th?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I move...or I support the motion to bracket and I have withdrawn my seven motions that I had for the bill. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Higgins.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Thank you, Mr. President. This move...or motion to bracket it, could I ask the Clerk or the Speaker or the President, whoever would know the answer, this motion to bracket it, if it fails, will we still be allowed to continue with amendments? Mr. Clerk.

PRESIDENT: Yes.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Thank you, Mr. President. All of you heard me a while ago ask Senator Hoagland if he would support Senator Hall's amendment up there for the displaced homemaker and he said he would. So now Senator DeCamp wants to bracket it, and I am wondering if it is bracketed, where will the amendment be? Mr. Clerk, if we would pass...or, Mr. President, if we would bracket, if we would pass on the amendment tonight for the displaced homemaker or any amendment, would it be in Final Reading?

CLERK: I don't understand your question, Senator, I'm sorry.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Well, I thought I heard Senator DeCamp say that the bill has already been sent to the Governor.

CLERK: Oh, no. It has been reported to Final Reading.
