PRESIDENT: There are other amendments on the desk if you aren't ready to go with this. Mr. Clerk, you may proceed.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next motion I have is a priority motion offered by Senator DeCamp. Senator DeCamp would move to bracket the bill until five o'clock, p.m.
