

and that is a good number because that is the "notch baby" year. They have 94 co-sponsors and they include John Duncan who is a Republican from Tennessee and he is the ranking minority member of the House, Ways and Means Committee. I know that many of you have been approached by it, a lot of people don't understand it. I, for one, myself don't understand it, but it stands to reason, and it is there, that those that are born between the ages of, I think it is 1917 and 1921, 1917, 1918, 1919, 1920 and 1921, those persons born during the notch years have their Social Security retirement benefits computed differently than those persons born before and after those years. They receive a Social Security benefit which is less than the benefit received by individuals born before those years. I urge the adoption of LR 268. And, I know there will be a lot of people in the State of Nebraska that are affected by this, that will appreciate your support.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Remmers, please.

SENATOR REMMERS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I hope you were listening to this resolution. I strongly support this resolution. I think as you can see the...some of the figures given, for instance, on the middle chart on someone with an average income of 6,000, it would be \$388 what they are receiving under the present formula. But if they were judged the same as someone born before 1917 that person would be receiving \$582, half again as much. In other words, I'm not quite sure why they came down so heavily on that group. If there were some financial reasons there, I think probably justly they should have taken it from those before 19... born before 1917 as well. But right now there is a great discrepancy between those that were born before 1917 and those that were born between 1917 and 1922. I would urge you to support this resolution. Maybe we can get some results in Washington. Generally I don't support...I'm not very excited about resolutions but I think this is one that needs our attention. Thank you.
