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been down here as long as Senator Beutler has and I feel perfectly comfortable with everything I have done and with everything I have seen my fellow senators do. I am not ashamed of what they do, what they say, where they go. That is their decision and when it comes in four years to be voted in or out, that is where the decision should be made, not on the body of this floor where we try to set up some rules that some committee is going to say that is wrong. Now, what do they do after they say it is wrong?

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Say that I am a bad boy.

PRESIDENT: One minute left.

SENATOR HABERMAN: What is the punishment? Well, they are going to make that up by rule and regulation. What, take my Chairmanship, move my seat, take a desk away from me? No, I say to you, let's just leave it the way it is because once you adopt 1, 2 or 3 or any part of this package you are getting into a box that you won't be able to get out and I am not ashamed of my conduct or the conduct of anybody in this body. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Remmers. The lineup is this, for your information, next Senators Landis, Wesely, DeCamp and Chambers.

SENATOR REMMERS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, this has always been a question, I think, as far as the credibility of the Legislature as a body has never been very high. I believe it was Mark Twain who wrote that the men are working quietly in the fields and the women are weeping at the fireside, the Legislature is in session. As a group, I'm afraid we have never had much credibility but I think that this effort to enforce these rules or to adopt these rules now suggests that maybe we have been doing some things unethically. Usually reforms follow some serious breach of conduct on the part of the officials. I don't think we have had any of that here. I would have to agree with Senator Haberman that I don't think that this rule is...any of these rules are enforceable if we did adopt them. How will they be enforced? Probably a hope that maybe this discussion, if it hits the press, will tell the people, hey, we are going to try to reform. Well, I am not
