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butt of every type of joke, every type of insult that is imaginable. That goes with the territory. This Legislature is never going to get a raise based on submitting it to the people for a vote. So you can tell them you are going to wash behind your ears, dig the wax out with Q-Tips, brush your teeth, gargle and behave in the way that a Boy Scout or a Girl Scout should behave and put on the ballot that we should get a pay increase and you still won't get a pay increase. We are never going to get that no matter what. So that is not a reason to pass this. Now, when I read these rules, as regrettable as it is, I am subject to certain failings of human nature, I see where they apply to everybody else in here except myself and the only thing that would bring me under these rules has specifically excluded me. This rule shall not be construed to apply to personal attire. So the only place where you could have gotten me, I am exempt, so I ought to be for these rules because they apply to all of you all but not to me. But because I am so close to being perfect...

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I am not in favor of imposing these rules on my brothers and sisters who are less so, and that is a quality that goes along with being perfect. But here is the serious thing about it now. When Senator Venditte was here he said, I am the most lawless person who was ever in the Legislature. There are letters that appear regularly in the Public Pulse and people get on these talk programs and say, I am totally unfit to be in the Legislature. They don't know what is wrong with the people who elect me, so I am aware that I am not universally liked, but the people who elect me send me down here to do a job and I am not going to jump through hoops or have any person or any collection of persons in this body or anyplace else tell me how to do what I think is right to do or try to make me refrain from doing that which I feel I must do. So, as Senator Remmers said, it might be the statement of a hope but I don't see where it is going to achieve anything in terms of regulating conduct, but if any provision of these rules is to be given serious consideration, it should be the one where we will not mooch and sponge off the lobbyists. That, I will look at because even if there is no way to enforce it, a statement ought to be made to the public on that score. So my general comments are not to be taken to say that this other stuff ought not to be adopted. But if you adopt it, I am going to ask you,
