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SENATOR HIGGINS: ...the appearance? Let us give the people the appearance of having integrity and honesty. So long as the image is there, it will sell. We even have public relations firms to help you create the right image so that the people in your district will vote for you. I'm not concerned with my image and I'm not concerned with my reputation. If I begin to become concerned with what other people say about me, then I probably will never stand up for what I really believe in because many times I have stood on this floor for things that nobody else would agree with and I might thereby earn myself a reputation of being a maverick or not going along or being different, but I'm not concerned with my image...

PRESIDENT: Your time is expiring.

SENATOR HIGGINS: ...and I just would state that I don't like the idea that somebody is going to impose upon me their idea of what is ethical and point out nothing in this tells you what the penalty is if you're found to be incredible. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, even though on occasion there is a lighthearted way of discussing the issues here, I think the matters are serious and I believe Senator Beutler is acting with the highest of intent, but on this issue as others, some of us just view things differently. Now, when a person such as myself from the background I come from enter a legislative assembly, it is clear there is going to be a clash between me and my views and most of the other people and their views on serious issues. I belong, in this society, to what is called an under class. There are people in this Legislature, and they represent people outside the Legislature, who feel I should stay in that under class. Because our outlooks are so different and our goals in life are different because you are the have and I am the have not, you would probably view somebody like Colonel Khadafy as an evil man or a nut as your president has described him. I see him as a great man. I have the highest admiration for Colonel Khadafy. You see, I'm aware that before he came to power almost two decades ago as a very young man that there was poverty, ignorance and great suffering in Libya. When the oil revenues began to come in, Khadafy provided housing
