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Constitution. Now there are some freedoms, not that the Constitution can grant, but that it supposedly protects, that are supposed to be important to a democracy. There is freedom of the press so that they can write anything that they want to, even if it is not true, even if it is not accurate, and even though a lot of them do that, I think the press should still be free from licensure and governmental control because the only reason the Constitution would protect the press against restrictions by government is because those who founded the Republic felt that one of the main obligations of the press is to criticize government, examine government, scrutinize it, and those of us who are supposed to govern and make known to the public anything we do or say that they feel is of public concern even if they are totally wrong and mistaken. So freedom of the press is very important. I don't even need to talk about freedom of religion because everybody knows the importance of that. Freedom of assembly, the right to associate with whomever you please, to associate with others, to petition your government for redress of grievances, that is an important freedom. Then the freedom of speech which I think is more important than all of the others and I think people should be fairly understanding of why that freedom is so important, but there is a fifth freedom which the framers of the Constitution neglected to mention and that is the freedom of officials, notably legislators, to mooch. So the five freedoms of speech, press, religion, assembly and the freedom to mooch, to sponge, to beg, to eat off people, to drink off them and say that in order to function as a legislator this right must be held as inviolate as the other four. Would anybody dare to impinge on somebody's right to practice his or her religion? No. The immunity of a legislator when he or she says whatever we please on the floor of the Legislature, no, but I would like to point out to Senator DeCamp that that immunity that grants us the right to say whatever we feel on the floor of the Legislature is pertaining to what comes out of the mouth, not what goes in. So I wouldn't equate the freedom of speech or vigorous debate on the floor of the Legislature with what has been raised to the right to mooch. I heard Senator Marsh talking about how if you can arrange this stuff so you can get your meals at the end of the month and then get them again free at the first of the month, that is not so bad. I haven't eaten and drunk \$25 worth of anything off of the lobbyists in the 16 years I have been down here. Those who call themselves lobbyists and have come to my
