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somewhat clear--clearer than the ambiguity that is there right now. Now, whether or not that is going to be beneficial as Senator Chambers pointed out, I don't know but we do spend a lot of time in this body debating whether or not we can do certain things occasionally and I always thought it was the job of the Rules Committee to try to clear up those kinds of circumstances whenever they arose. Now whether or not we should have a situation that requires 30 votes to revive a bill killed or not is a different question. Maybe we shouldn't but the fact of the matter is we all know that a constitutional amendment which is drafted as a resolution requires exactly the same steps and procedures in terms of a public hearing, in terms of the three stages of debate that a bill does and it makes no sense to me that the rule is not clear that would indicate that if that is the case, if we are going to treat it that way, then as long as we treat bills in the manner that we do now, we had ought to treat this the same way. Now I don't really care. If you want to go the other direction and you want to say, okay, we are going to have bills, you can revive any bill that is killed with only 25 votes, that is all right. We are going to have another occasion to do that a little later on, but I would plead with you to treat them both the same since we deal with them both the same out here. It just seems to me that the Rules Committee is trying its best to come up with some procedures that would take less time later on in this body and maybe make us look a little less ridiculous to those folks that are in the balcony watching us occasionally. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Morehead. There is an amendment on the desk. I recognized her, I did...yes, go ahead, Senator. Proceed, Senator Morehead. Do you wish to speak to this measure?

SENATOR MOREHEAD: I don't want to speak to the amendment. I will wait. I haven't heard the amendment or seen the amendment. I want to speak to the issue as it existed before the amendment.

PRESIDENT: There is an amendment on the desk but I did recognize you. If you wish to talk now, you may.

SENATOR MOREHEAD: All right, thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President and members of the body, I sincerely appreciate Senator Vickers' comments. Maybe in light of the
