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all stay in our seats. And I think it is particularly difficult on the Sergeants-at-Arms who are driven nuts in a situation like that, running around and trying to keep us all sitting in our seats, listening to the debate intently. So I think the...Senator Wesely has made my case. Thank you, Senator Wesely. So I think we should give us all a break. By adopting this rule it will simply mean that we're not required to be under call the whole time. We can still go under call if that is necessary. Any members can still ask to put us under call if he'd like us to be under call for the debate, but we don't have to and I think most of all we owe it to our Sergeants-at-Arms to adopt this proposal. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Withem. Under our new system, you don't have to talk in right to the microphone, Senator.

SENATOR WITHEM: Thank you, thank you. I'll try to be quiet, thank you. Mr. President, members of the body, I, likewise, support this proposal. I would like to put a little different perspective on it in all due respect to Senators Morehead and Hoagland. Their arguments made it sound like this is more of a for the Senator's personal convenience sort of thing so we are not physically having to sit in our seats and we can get up and relax and such. I guess the perspective I'd like to put on it is that I think we have two different types of duties here. We have a duty to participate in and be attentive to the deliberations of the body. We also have a duty to perform other tasks, meet with constituents, answer telephone calls, work on legislation, work with our staffs, work with the bill drafter's office, other sorts of personal types of responsibilities. Most of us I think do a fairly effective job of balancing those two. We are here and attentive to the debate and our responsibilities on the floor, but we also find some time to slip away to do those other responsibilities. During the time we're under call we don't have that option. We are forced to be here and be attentive to the floor debate at all times. Those other tasks then sometimes go wanting. During the time we're on Final Reading and the bills are being voted on one at a time in kind of machine gun fashion, it's probably a good proposal that we be here and that we cast these votes and that we are attentive. However, in the times that the two senators have described when we are basically debating bills, motion after
