SPEAKER NICHOL: No objection, so ordered.

CLERK: That is all that I have now.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right, so that you don't get exercised about me doing something irregular here, may I just explain to you the procession that happened. A little while ago Senator Hartnett came up and visited with me about whether or not we would take this matter up this afternoon and I told him that we had another situation coming up before, namely Senator Wesely's rule change, and that we would take Senator Wesely's rule change up and forget about his until tomorrow. As we drew close to Senator Wesely's taking it up, Senator Wesely advised that he did not want to take it up today so he goes to the bottom of the pile of this type of business, which there is no problem so far, but we had considerable time left and I called Senator Hartnett back and said, would you mind taking it up today? And he said that he would and we both knew what the situation was. Now, I feel somewhat obligated to Senator Hartnett since I did ask him to take it up this afternoon, to cooperate with him. This is rather unusual and not the usual way we will be handling things during the rest of the session. But I since I had asked Senator Hartnett to take it up this afternoon when I had asked him...when we had agreed that it would not be taken up, why I think that we should offer them the courtesy of bringing it up before those tomorrow and discussing it to whatever length you want because we will have time enough I think in the forenoon and have a vote on it tomorrow. If the votes are not here tomorrow, why it is too bad, but I am not doing it to save his votes because I had asked them to take it up after we had agreed not to take it. Any problems with that? Okay. With that, Senator Haberman.
