SENATOR WITHEM: I believe the votes seem to be kind of slow coming in, I think I'll ask for a call of the house.

PRESIDENT: A call of the house has been requested.

SENATOR WITHEM: I will not request that all absent members be summoned back.

PRESIDENT: All those in favor of the house coming under call vote aye, opposed vote nay. Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.
