SENATOR BEYER: Well, I guess the question I ask is that most of the stationery and everything is printed up the other way and it would be a tremendous expense to change all that. I think that if we could...I have no objection to it, I'm just saying maybe it would be better down the road because of the expense of changing letterheads, stuff like that at this time in our budgetary crisis that we have, that it might be better to go with our proposed change on the other...or make a date certain to do it.

SENATOR BEYER: I'm on my time yet, so I'll let Senator Marsh...

PRESIDENT: Senator Marsh wants to get in on this.

SENATOR MARSH: I'd like to say that we should be making the name change. We do not need to change our stationery. As it comes up for reprinting, it would...then they would know it ahead of time, but we can go ahead and make the name change without it being any additional expense and I would urge us to do so since, in fact, we should have made it last year. We certainly should make it this year and then as you need new stationery you have that change made.

SENATOR BEYER: I'd have no objection to that since it is on the record now that that is the intent because that...you know, I guess I'm just concerned about going into...destroying all the stationery we have and everything else and that at this time. I guess if you could amend it to say as changes are needed, we would change it now, but then not make any other changes except as needed, if that makes sense, I guess.
