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games that people play while pretending to be so much concerned about the welfare of the public and I'm probably the only one who will stand on this floor consistently and say the welfare of the public is not at stake, there is a game being played, there are lobbyists sending in orders and most of you have seen me go through that. The day will come when some of you may have to invoke this provision of compelling attendance. If you leave it in the hands of the Speaker, not the Speaker, but the presiding officer and it happens to be the Lieutenant Governor and the proposition is one which the Governor doesn't happen to favor, do you think the Lieutenant Governor is going to compel the attendance of people who may make it go a way the Governor does not want? No. So, he can say that all he's doing is enforcing the rule, but I think it's more than that. If he has discretion to say yes or no, depending on the circumstances, he is not enforcing a rule. He is making a quasi judicial judgment. He is weighing factors, balancing and then making a determination, not based on what the rule says. If he is merely enforcing a rule, here is what would happen and I'll give you an example. You cannot amend an amendment to an amendment, so if somebody attempts to do that, he simply reads the rule and says, that's out of order, and it is. He is enforcing the rule. But when it comes to a discretionary matter such as this...

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...then he is not merely enforcing a rule, he is making a value judgment and he determines whether it is necessary to compel people, and on what will he base that. How he feels at the time and the factors that come to bear on him in making his judgment. But you see already what the Chair has said, that it is not something that is appealable because it is a mere enforcement of the rule. I disagree with that, but there are a lot of things I disagree with and am voted down on, but at least I am saying these things, it's in the record and I may have a chance in the future to say I told you so. And I assure you that I will.

PRESIDENT: There are no other lights for speaking. Do you want to regard that as your closing, Senator Chambers? Okay, you may close.
