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conducted because there are not enough people to conduct whatever is to be done. So if you want to get into the possibilities that can arise under a rule, they are infinite in number and variety in a manner of speaking. But the reality is that very few of them are likely to actually occur. That's why I gave the concrete example of the time that it did occur when compelling those other people was really made necessary. That actually happened and the majority who did not have enough to work their will, but had enough to keep everybody here, would not release any people who had other things to do and other places to go, but they didn't. They weren't able to prevent the compelling of others because the Lieutenant Governor at that time read the rule that a member could request the others to be compelled and caused them to be compelled. So I think first of all we should not give the power to dictate to the Legislature over to a member of the executive branch because there could be crucial issues to be decided and we're giving the Governor's Office the power to determine the outcome. I think the Legislature should have that control and I think it should be within the power of any member once the house is placed under call to invoke the requirement that everybody not here be compelled to be brought. That's my amendment that I'm offering, and if you vote it up or down, it really doesn't make me personally too much difference, but I see certain prerogatives of the Legislature being chipped away and if the majority accepts it, fine. And that will help you understand why the other day I said people are not going to look at me and say Ernie is an example of the Legislature or represents the Legislature because my standards are considerably different from those of a majority in the Legislature on a lot of occasions.

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Notice, Senator Hannibal, I didn't say better, I said different, but based on my point of view, the fact that I cleave to them, in my view, they are better or I wouldn't hold to them.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. The motion is the Chambers amendment to the Hannibal proposal. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. We are voting on the Chambers amendment to the Hannibal proposed rule change.
