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over 30 or more constitutional amendments in one session and I understand last year we had 27. Now 27 constitutional amendments split up between 13 committees, we might end up with a great amount of constitutional amendment changes on the ballot, and one of the things that we always tried to do in exec session, we tried to take into consideration how many constitutional amendments would be put on the ballot for that upcoming election and I think it is detrimental to any amendment if there is 10 or 15 constitutional changes put on the ballot. We tried to keep them at a very low amount. We had to use our priority system and we always kept in mind that we already have three or four or maybe even five constitutional amendments that would go before this body and we did take that very strongly into consideration before sending them to the floor of the Legislature. So I am very skeptical about the organizational change. I was not in on any of the meetings but I do say that we are treading very, very, very much so on the Committee of Agriculture and Constitutional Revision and Recreation. Nobody has mentioned Recreation. That covers a great amount of people and bills that come into that committee pertaining to hunting, fishing, whatever. I thought it was a very important committee. I think we should keep that and constitutional amendments together. We have done the best we could on the amendments that were put before us. Spreading them over the 13 committees you may end up with a lot of constitutional amendments that shouldn't actually be put on the ballot. We don't want to confuse the people. Every time there is a whole bunch of amendments, my phone starts ringing and they say what are we going to do with all these constitutional amendments, I don't understand them. We had a problem with Initiative 300. The people had to go out and get the signatures for that, but I will say one thing that the constitutional amendments are very, very important to the people of this state and we don't want to confuse them because at that point if we put 10 or 15 on the ballot we certainly will never get anything passed. Thank you.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President and members of the body, I, too, am concerned about this change in our rules in our committee structure. I am very concerned about the Agriculture and Environment issue. In this new proposal it deletes environment from the Ag Committee and I feel that
