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that suggestion but that is a good suggestion that has come forth from this general discussion, so what we presented here in Format II is not in concrete and can be changed. Now let's talk about constitutional amendments because people have spent a great deal of time discussing constitutional amendments. The constitutional amendment is, in fact, the basic law that we operate under and I think that that basic law should be considered in conjunction with other statutory laws that are in effect in that area, and by sending the constitutional amendment proposals to the subject matter area, they are going to be considered in relation to each other. Now the idea of limiting the number of constitutional amendments by seven members that are presented to this total body for deliberative debate I think is something that we should consider also. Do we want seven members of a committee arbitrarily saying, well, we don't think we need to clutter up the ballot with too many amendments no matter how important they are? If they relate correctly to the subject matter area, then I think they should come before this whole body to decide whether they go on the ballot. There are many things outside of this legislative body that are going to impact whether a constitutional amendment is adopted or rejected. There are social forces at work on the outside of this body. There are economic issues that are at work on the outside of this body and we have seen if we don't allow these to come before us for full and open debate, then sometimes the public acts and they will act anyway in the initiative or referendum process.

SENATOR LAMB: Thirty seconds, Senator.

SENATOR MOREHEAD: Thank you. They will act in the initiative and referendum process, so the idea of our limiting them doesn't necessarily limit them. I know change is difficult and I know that the chairmen of the committees feel they must stand and defend the committee as it is now. But I suggest to you that renaming these committees to effect what has happened outside this body socially is indeed a process which we need to adapt. So I speak again in favor of this rule.

SENATOR LAMB: The Chair recognizes Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Question.
