

and tell me that it's fine, Bellevue among them. Secondly, that there isn't a listing of the number of part-time teachers that teach more than half time and less than full time in one place. The actuary for the Retirement Committee and the counsel of the committee tell me that we're talking about a very minimal amount, that in the event we were even talking about a full-time teacher, which we're not, it would be \$45.00 a year per that kind of teacher. Now, there are 30,000 teachers in the State of Nebraska, but the overwhelming majority of them are full-time teachers. So I don't have a figure for you. The public school systems that have looked at it seem to approve and, thirdly, the Retirement Committee staff tell me that we're talking about a very, very minimal number of people and money. I would join you, however, in asking for a fiscal analysis before Select File, if that would be of help to you.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Okay, I just...I didn't want something to go through, Dave, without us having some idea because the only people who...or the Bellevue Public Schools, Bellevue, Bellevue, Lincoln are the only ones who testified on the bill and I don't know how it's going to affect my area where we might have more part-time teachers than Bellevue and Lincoln. So if they could give us an estimate or anything, it would sure help. I'll support your bill, but I would like to have a handle on what it is going to cost.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Haberman, I believe there is a fiscal note in your book, isn't there?

SENATOR HABERMAN: I have the fiscal note and they're blank. I have the fiscal notes, Mr. Speaker, but they're blank.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Well, that doesn't help much, does it?

SENATOR HABERMAN: No.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right. Senator Landis, would you like to close?
