

PRESIDENT: Do you wish to withdraw it from discussion at the present time and hold it over?

SENATOR BEYER: If we could, Senator Haberman, and I and Senator Warner can get together and get this addressed in proper order and proper spacing in the bill.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, I am wondering if we couldn't advance to Select File and make the changes on Select File. I believe this has been done many, many, many times. I would be willing to do all this if we could advance to Select File and then I will sit down and we can work this out.

PRESIDENT: Is that your wish, Senator Beyer, or do you want to...?

SENATOR BEYER: Not specifically...I am not sure where we are at right now.

PRESIDENT: Senator Beyer, are you finished? Senator Schmit is next on the speaking list on the amendment to the amendment.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I am concerned I guess that with the adoption of Senator Haberman's amendment to the Warner amendment Senator Haberman's bill would no longer do what we want it to do and I think, Senator Warner, if you would yield to a question, it is my understanding that your amendment removes the provision that allows the transportation from a stockpile to market or factory. And, of course, this is a sugar beet haulers' bill and the principal reason for Senator Haberman's bill is to allow the sugar beet haulers to transport from the stockpile. So if the Haberman amendment is adopted to the Warner amendment, then we just as well kill the bill, Senator Haberman, because you are going to be aced out if I understand correctly. Senator Warner, would you answer me as to whether or not your amendments remove the provision that allows the transportation from stockpile to factory?

SENATOR WARNER: Yeah, Senator Schmit, as I indicated earlier, there is a fine line of difference between stock...if any, between stockpile and storage. For example,
