I had a pile of milo on the ground at home and I wasn't storing it, it was stockpiled, and as a matter of fact we hauled it a couple of months later, and so my impression is that stockpile, leaving it in there, is broader than just the sugar beet that you are addressing. I understand the sugar beet problem, but as it has been described to me, usually that sugar beet problem is from the field. I don't quite understand why the same problem exists in the stockpile as perhaps it does from the field, significantly different.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Thank you, Senator Warner. It is up to Senator Haberman but I think that I would not support the Haberman amendment to the Warner amendment and I probably would not support the Warner amendment at this time. I think it would be very magnanimous of Senator Warner if he would allow it to be moved to Select File and cleared up on Select File but I don't know that he is in that kind of a mood today, but I would not support neither the amendment to the amendment nor the amendment at this time.

PRESIDENT: Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, my amendment was hastily drawn. I would like to withdraw it.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is withdrawn. We are back to the Warner amendment. Senator Chronister, do you wish to speak? Okay, Senator. Any further discussion on the bill? On the Warner amendment? Senator Warner may close then.

SENATOR WARNER: I would move adoption of the amendment. It clearly does prohibit the second trip and that is the purpose of it. I stated it was to get the crop out of the field, period.

PRESIDENT: Senator Warner, excuse me.

SENATOR WARNER: That is what the amendment does.

PRESIDENT: Okay. Senator Haberman, did you wish to say something. I recognized Senator Warner to close.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Yes, I would, Mr. President, if it is allowable.
