

notification in so that there could be a cross check to make sure that this tank is still out there and being used because I can foresee a lot of people leaving the tanks and not reporting it and so they would still be on the records. The purpose of this is to put in as least restrictive a mechanism as possible on the individual farmers and ranchers who have these tanks, but still have some means to know where they're at, still have some means for people to report if there is an accident and as I indicated to you earlier I will discuss that with you a little later on Select, the issue of what happens, if there in fact, is an accident and if people do have some responsibilities for clean up. That is the basic premise of this amendment and I would urge your adoption of it.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Pappas, please.

SENATOR PAPPAS: (No response.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: Okay, was that your closing? Oh, we have an amendment, I understand to the amendment. All right.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Pappas would move to amend the Vickers-Rod Johnson amendment. (Pappas amendment appears on page 298 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Pappas, did you wish to withdraw that?

SENATOR PAPPAS: No.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right. You're on.

SENATOR PAPPAS: I move to amend the amendments. On page 4 of the amendments, line 13, replace "may" with "shall", in line 17, replace "may" with "shall". Basically it's talking about the State Fire Marshal shall adopt and promulgate rules and regulations governing release, detection, prevention and correction regulation as applicable to all owners and operators as, I'm changing the may to a shall, be necessary to protect human health. If we're talking about something to protect human health, then we should delete a "may" and put a "shall" in so make sure we are talking about human health public safety and the environment. Then a little further down it says, regulations may, we're leaving that may alone, distinguish between types, classes and ages
