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and discuss it. But I repeat, I'm not sure but what a restructuring avoids dealing with the real issue or issues. I'll use one more example. One of the things we are doing, and I guess I can live with it, it is not going to bother me, I may not be around probably, I'll be over in the Governor's mansion, of course. But anyway we are taking energy, we are taking energy legislation away from Banking, Commerce... Jerry says he doesn't need an assistant, my good friend, Jerry Warner. (Laughter.) Okay. Let's... energy legislation. As everybody knows energy was one of the hot issues, one of the hot issues. Banking, Commerce and Insurance Committee, with the cooperation and work of the Legislature, dealt with the energy legislation, I think probably, as efficiently as any committee, yet we are moving it away from there. Proof that we dealt with it, people like Senator Remmers, who opposed us vigorously, after finally seeing how it was working became an active participant in the things we were doing. The committee and individuals received national awards from like Honeywell and others for our handling of energy legislation. So if the work load was so heavy, and if "we couldn't do it," then it should have shown up on energy if anywhere. Yet that isn't where it showed up. We handled that pretty well. But we are changing that in the restructure. I repeat again, and no offense intended and no targets or shots taken at anyone, are we dealing with form over substance through the restructuring? Are we ducking the real issue? Is the real issue that we need to make some adjustments in committees? In other words we need to say, okay, if you have this many bills how many are the heavy bills, how many are the weighty bills. For example there is one bill, appropriations bill, that is going to take an incredible amount of time in committee. There is another bill, called the wild card bill, of which the Banking Committee will have three or four this year, that take maybe one to two minutes in committee, and that is giving them an exceptionally large amount of time. What do they do? They simply annually update the laws with respect to federal and state credit unions, federal and state banks, federal and state savings and loans. Four or five bills there, total of four or five minutes, yet in our restructuring, in terms and numbers, these are counted the same as four or five appropriations bills, four or five bills redoing government in Government Committee. So I'm not sure number of bills, which we made the god, we made the absolute god in redoing the committees, I'm not sure that is where you should put your attention.
