Also there is presently a bingo parlor in Nebraska now which they talked about there wasn't any other states under 280 that have gaming operations or gambling operations and plus there are several in the State of Washington and other places around the country. So there are cases going on across the country now on different reservations and it doesn't make any difference whether they have retrocession or not. They can do that themselves. Also there is a Supreme Court case, United States Supreme Court, through Oklahoma which the way it looks will be upheld that Indian reservations cannot exceed any of the limits or anything else that's state law. It's a challenge on the state law. So I think they are very adequately covered. I think these three WHEREASES that Senator Hoagland is responsible for drafting, I think everybody knows Senator Hoagland's concern in the past and also in the future about gambling in Nebraska and every place else and I don't think Senator Hoagland would put something in here that isn't definitely needed.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Vard Johnson and then Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, before lunch Senator Goll offered an amendment that would strike, that did strike three different recitations in the preamble to the retrocession resolution and as you may remember I got up and I said, inasmuch as these three recitations in the preamble to the resolution seem to give offense to some local people in Senator Goll's district and maybe to some other individuals in Senator Goll's district, and inasmuch as the salient part of the retrocession resolution lay in the body of the resolution and not in the preambles, I could see no good reason for us to give offense and, therefore, we could go along with Senator Goll's amendment and remove those three recitations that involve local facts that gave offense. Flushed with victory, Senator Goll has now offered another amendment to take three new paragraphs out of the preamble to the resolution. Now these three paragraphs are different in nature from the three that Senator Goll caused us to strike earlier because these three paragraphs, to a large extent, deal with this Legislature's relationship to a coequal, the Winnebago Tribe, in terms of the gambling issue. Senator Hoagland and other members of this Legislature have been concerned that in one way or another retrocession will aid
