CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Vickers would move to withdraw LR 9. Senator Vickers made his motion on the twenty-first of January. It is found on page 423 of the Journal.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Tom Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President and members, as sometimes happens, we sometimes have great ideas, but at the wrong time and this was one of those times when I had a great idea but the timing is not quite right. So I would just ask your indulgence to withdraw LR 9. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Is there discussion? If not, the motion is to withdraw LR 9. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. The motion is to withdraw LR 9 on the request of Senator Vickers. Please record your vote. We need additional...just a little more help on this withdrawal of Senator Vickers' resolution. Please record your vote. Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to withdraw the resolution, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion carried. The resolution is withdrawn. And the next from Senator DeCamp.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator DeCamp would move to withdraw LB 884.

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, 884 was a bill, a comprehensive bill dealing with the "Fair Trade Practices Act". It was brought to us by the Attorney General's Office, requested by the Attorney General. Reluctantly, we did agree to introduce it. After examining it, a number of people have concluded it is just too heavy, too deep, too big and too broad for this session and the Attorney General has agreed to go back and rework it and redo it. And so I'd ask just to withdraw the bill and he concurs with that.
