

this all out, and if Senator Labeledz would, I'd like to ask her a question.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Yes, Senator Morehead.

SENATOR MOREHEAD: Senator Labeledz, if we do not adopt your amendment, then does the bill stand? I have a green copy in my folder and I'm not sure where the particular piece of legislation is right now. If your amendment is not adopted, then on page 3, the underlined new material, would that...that is still intact, is it, from action last year?

SENATOR LABEDZ: What new material are you talking about?

SENATOR MOREHEAD: Well, the underlined part that says, and new subsection (c), on line 19.

SENATOR LABEDZ: No, the way that it stands now, (c) of the particular risks associated with the abortion procedures to be employed in her case and (d) agencies and services available for prevention of future unintended pregnancies. Twenty-two or twenty-seven, all the way on the next page to line 3 have been deleted with the Landis amendment, I believe of last year.

SENATOR MOREHEAD: Oh, all right. This is what I needed to know. Thank you very much. I appreciate that. What...if this is in the criminal code, if we adopt your amendment, what would be the criminal sanctions or the possible punishment if this was not applied by the physician?

SENATOR LABEDZ: If the doctor delegates the authority and they are not qualified counselors, he could be charged with a misdemeanor, the doctor could be charged.

SENATOR MOREHEAD: The doctor could be charged with...

SENATOR LABEDZ: It is the responsibility of the doctor, yes.

SENATOR MOREHEAD: ...with a misdemeanor, so there would be, in fact, a punishment then involved if the doctor did not use this part as a part of informed consent. At one time there was a 48-hour waiting period between the time a young woman consented to abortion and between that time of consent and the actual performance of and during that time informed
