

providing the information specified in the informed consent section of the abortion statutes shall be deemed qualified to do so, advise and provide such information only if at the minimum he or she has training in each of the following subjects that I just mentioned." The language in the bill now is word for word what was approved by the Supreme Court in the Akron decision. Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes...first of all, let me announce that Senator Hannibal has guests in the north balcony this morning that we are very happy to welcome to the Legislature so that you can watch our procedure of making ideas into laws. We have 28 eighth graders from Boys Town accompanied by their teachers. Welcome to the Legislature. Stand and be recognized. Senator Higgins.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Question.

PRESIDENT: The question has been called for. There are other lights on the question to speak. The question is, shall the debate cease? Do I see five hands? I do not see five hands. I do now. The question is, shall the debate now close? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. The motion is to close debate. Please record your vote. Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries and the debate is closed. The Chair recognizes Senator Labeledz for closing.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Thank you, Mr. President. I spoke at length on the amendment, on the bill and I relinquish my closing to Senator DeCamp.

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp. May we have order in the Chamber, please, so that we may hear the speaker. (Gavel.) Order. Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President and members, Senator Johnson, Senator Landis and Senator Chambers brought up some very important points and the points got down to something like this. We should not make the decision based upon "ultimately purely religious grounds" or let "purely religious reasons dictate our decision on this issue." Ultimately, though I think it can be said that it is not
